

I remain expressionless, listening.




26 NICUs in Canada, Australia and New Zealand

Parental intervention:

Presence > 6 hours per day
Attend educational sessions
Actively involved in infant care

Significant Outcomes:

-Higher daily weight gain-Higher breast milk feeding at discharge-Lower parental stress scores


